



Nargess Shadbeh is the Director for the Farmworker Program at the Oregon Law Center, where she works to improve the conditions for farmworkers through litigation and advocacy including successfully arguing for the construction of affordable farmworker housing within cities, advocating for better labor housing standards, and working to reduce exposure to pesticides by advocating for stronger regulations.

Ms Shadbeh has received several honors for her work, including a Harvard Law School Wasserstein Fellowship in 2006, which recognizes lawyers who have distinguished themselves in public interest law. She has a prior member of the Oregon state Judicial Task Force for Racial Justice and Ethnic Issues, and was awarded the Hon. Mercedes Diaz Award by Oregon Women Lawyers, which recognizes an individual who has made an outstanding contribution to promoting minorities in the community. Ms. Shadbeh is also the 2020 recipient of the Public Interest Law Project's Amburgey Award at the Lewis & Clark Law School, her alma mater.
